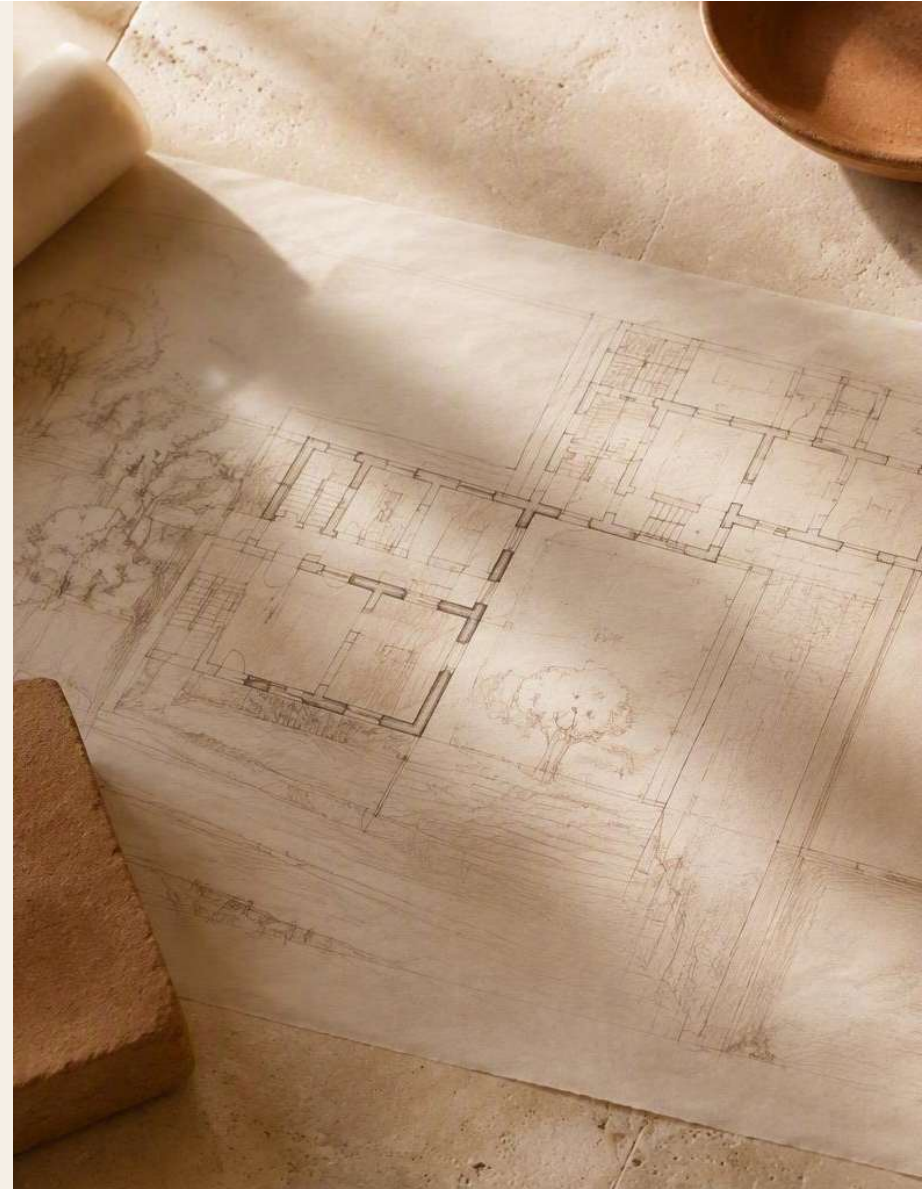

The Architect and the Bridge

- A master architect calculates every angle, material, and support so the bridge can stand in the storm.
- When crews revise the blueprint for trends or convenience, the structure loses its integrity.
- Today we look at an institution facing structural renegotiation by our culture: marriage.



A Divine Institution in a Shifting World

The Origin of Marriage

- Marriage is a divine institution created by God.
- Not an evolving human or cultural invention.
- It is the foundational building block of society.

The Cultural Tension

- Definitions of identity, sexuality, and marriage keep *shifting*.
- The change creates deep political and social divides.
- The world is demanding the church to renegotiate what God settled.

Our Purpose This Morning

To anchor our hearts in God's immutable design with unwavering conviction — while learning to engage our world with Christlike gentleness.

“Have you not read that he who created them from the beginning made them male and female, and said, ‘Therefore a man shall leave his father and his mother and hold fast to his wife, and the two shall become one flesh’? So they are no longer two but one flesh. What therefore God has joined together, let not man separate.”

MATTHEW 19:4–6

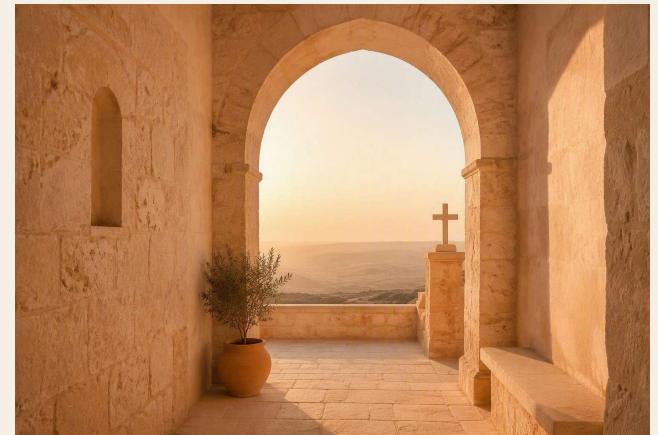
PART ONE

The Distinct Blueprint of Creation

Complementarity · One flesh · The boundary of intimacy

Designed Complementarity

- God intentionally created humanity as male and female *to reflect His image*.
- The differences between them are purposeful and beautiful.
- They are not interchangeable parts — each bears the image in a distinct way.



“So God created man in his own image ... male and female he created them.”

GENESIS 1:27

The One-Flesh Standard

Two distinct persons

One man and one woman — complementary, not identical.

Joined as one flesh

A covenant union, not merely a contract or arrangement.

The only framework

This binary union is the one pattern Scripture calls marriage.

“Therefore a man shall leave his father and his mother and hold fast to his wife, and they shall become one flesh.”

GENESIS 2:24

The Boundary of Intimacy

- God designed sexual intimacy *exclusively* for this union: lifelong, covenantal, and between *a man and a woman*.
- The boundary is not restriction for its own sake — it is protection and blessing.
- Any sexual activity outside it misses God's design for human flourishing.

“Let marriage be held in honor among all, and let the marriage bed be undefiled, for God will judge the sexually immoral and adulterous.”

HEBREWS 13:4





PART TWO

The Contemporary Contrast and Cultural Reality

How do we hold the truth firmly and the person tenderly?

The Missing Framework

- Scripture offers no framework for same-sex marriage — not a silence to be filled, but a design already given.
- Ephesians 5 grounds marriage in a specific picture: husband and wife reflecting Christ and the Church.
- Same-sex unions omit that male-female reflection, and so cannot carry the meaning marriage was made to carry.

“Therefore a man shall leave his father and mother and hold fast to his wife, and the two shall become one flesh.’ This mystery is profound, and I am saying that it refers to Christ and the church.”

EPHESIANS 5:31–32

Before We Go Further

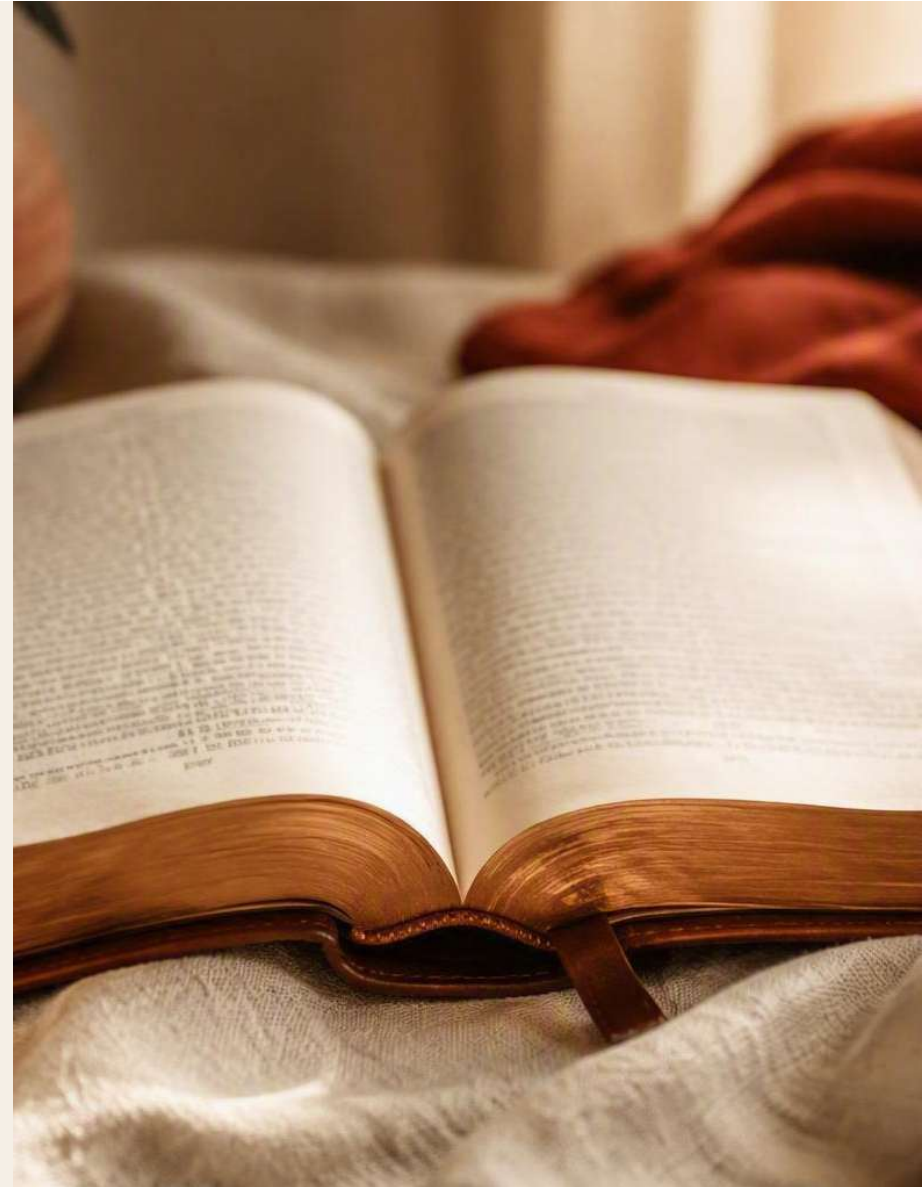
- Every human being experiences the brokenness of fallen desires. None of us stands outside this.
- If you are navigating same-sex attraction, you are not a problem to be solved or a debate to be won.
- You are a person Christ died for, and you are welcome here.



Consistent *Biblical* Ethics

- Scripture consistently prohibits homosexual practice across both Testaments.
- It always stands alongside every other form of sexual sin - never singled out as uniquely disqualifying.
- God holds one single, universal standard for holy living, and it addresses all of us.

Romans 1:26-27 · 1 Corinthians 6:9-10



The Pastoral Perspective

Every heart is broken

Every human being experiences the brokenness of fallen desires. None of us stand outside this.

Identity in Christ

Our culture teaches that our deepest desires are our identity. Scripture offers something more freeing: your identity is in Christ - not in your desires, and not in your resistance to them.

The Christian's Kingdom Responsibility in Political Conflict

How do we engage the conflicts of our day without losing our witness?

Truth Without Compromise

- Believers advocate for God's design as the optimal foundation for a flourishing society.
- We cannot rename good as evil or evil as good to gain cultural approval.
- Our primary allegiance belongs *to the Kingdom of God* — **never to a political party.**

“Woe to those who call evil good and good evil, who put darkness for light and light for darkness, who put bitter for sweet and sweet for bitter!”

ISAIAH 5:20

Christlike Engagement

MARKED BY

Humility, respect, gentleness, and kindness in every word and act.

FORBIDDEN

Slander, mockery, and treating ideological opponents as the ultimate enemy.

THE REAL COST

Winning an argument at the expense of the Gospel's reputation is a spiritual defeat.

“Always be prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and respect.”

1 PETER 3:15

People Over Platforms

- Political debate reduces people to statistics and adversaries.
- Christians must see every individual as *an image-bearer of God*.
- The church's deepest impact comes from living holy, loving lives — not from rage-driven activism.
- We must trust God's ultimate sovereignty over the outcome.



The Eternal Picture and the Final Charge

The Eternal Picture

- Human marriage is temporary — a living metaphor.
- It points to an eternal reality: Christ's sacrificial love for His bride, the Church.
- The sign was never meant to be the destination.

The Final Charge

- Stand firm in moral clarity, speak.
- Move forward with Christlike gentleness.
- Invite a watching world to find fulfillment not in human relationships or political victories, but in *submission to the Creator*.

An Invitation
